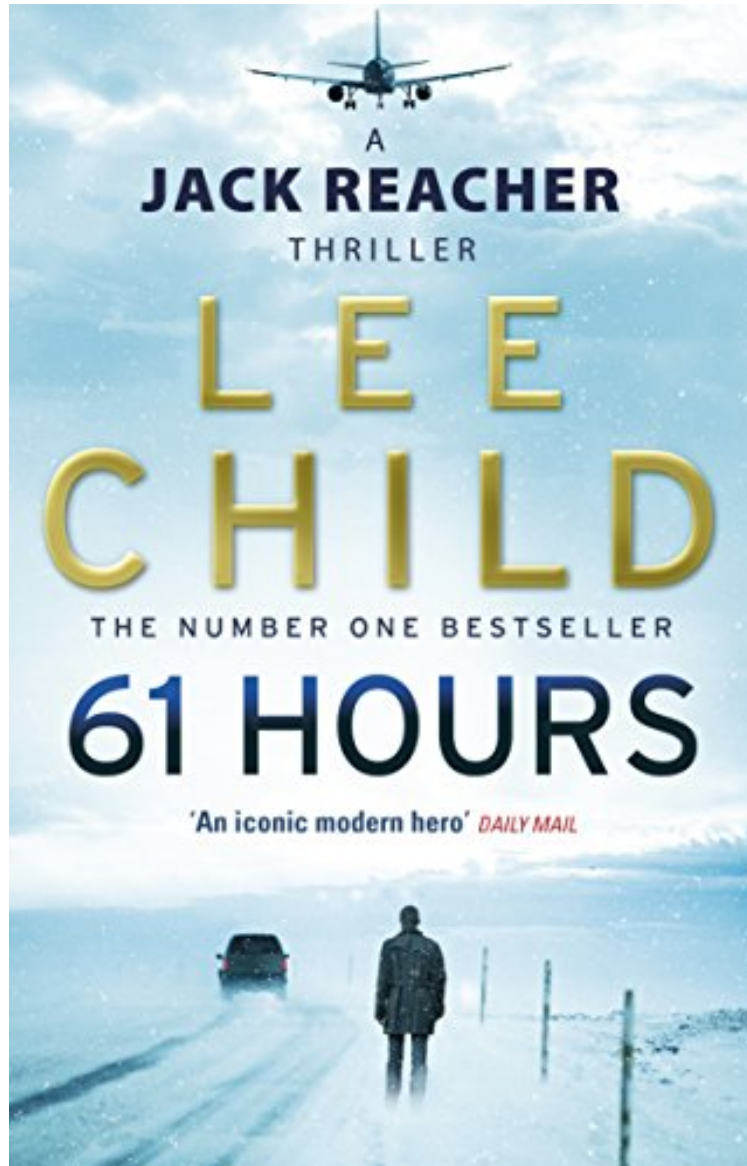

So it was a must for me to buy this latest sequel on the publishing day. And of course I will buy the even newer one to be released on September 30, 2010. But for me 61 hours was a slight disappointment. The action is limited to a very small place in the middle of nowhere and happens during a snowstorm. That snowstorm is described in detail, extensively and repeatedly. The story is quite thin and quite slow. For all those of you who liked "Gone tomorrow" you will miss the speed and the layers....61 hours is still a well-written book and still classes above other books of the same genre but still it did not meet my expectations...It seems Lee Child is running out of storylines and is more and more retreating to the inner thoughts of his hero....so this book in essence is about the self-reflection of Reacher and not so much about a new adventure.
